



## Human Rights Declaration - Our Statement

### Rationale

Everyone has the right to free Primary Education Under the Universal Declaration of Human Rights , Article 26.

### Purpose

At Kamo Primary we will not allow barriers to stop a student receiving an education appropriate to their needs, interests and aspirations. We therefore declare we will strive to honour that education is both a human right in itself and an indispensable means of realising other human rights.

### Guidelines

We will practice that the right to education involves learning about rights and responsibilities. It is about creating high-quality teaching and learning environments where there is freedom from violence, bullying and harassment; where individuality and diversity are respected, and where all those involved are able to participate fully. The right to education encompasses, civil and political rights, and economic, social and cultural rights.

- Encouraging students to “respect themselves, others and human rights”
- recognises te reo Māori, New Zealand Sign Language and English as official languages for the delivery of the curriculum and as taught subjects
- acknowledges that a curriculum that reflects and values te ao Māori, strengthens identity and belonging of all New Zealanders
- recognises the special place of Pacific languages
- recognises cultural diversity and inclusion


